

Cyber Security from Ransomware

Ransomware is a type of malware (malicious software) that encrypts and locks access to a victim's files, devices, or entire network until a ransom is paid, often in cryptocurrency, to receive the decryption key. Attackers may also threaten to sell or leak stolen data (double extortion), and they often deliver ransomware via phishing emails or exploit vulnerabilities in a system. Ransomware attacks can have devastating financial and operational consequences for individuals and organizations.

To defend against ransomware, small businesses should regularly back up data to an offline location, keep all software and systems updated, train employees to spot phishing and suspicious activity, enforce strong passwords with multi-factor authentication (MFA), use firewalls and antivirus software, and have a clear incident response plan ready. Mike discussed getting prepared for Towing issue that will lead to legislative action in 2026. The Board will brainstorm any anticipated issues at the next meeting on July 15, 2025 at 5:15 pm. All members are welcome to join in. We may do a survey monkey to see if members have specific issues to address. We will summarize the current law and downfalls of lowa's shortest in the nation holding period for discussion with Jim, our Lobbyist.

A GMARE conference call was held last week on June 19, 2025, at 10:00 am. Good progress was made on wrapping up last year's successful event, dividing out the duties going forward and putting together an agenda based on feedback from the follow-up discussion at GMARE. A venue in Omaha that is not in the downtown area and with good parking has been identified. The dates available are March 5-6, 2026.

The Nebraska folks will put a hold on the venue if it has adequate training and vendors rooms available and bring that information back to the next planning call on July 24, 2025, at 10:00. Mike Swift, Pat Rooff, and Sue Schauls are the three lowa committee members for GMARE planning. We are still waiting to get the proceeds check from 2025.

The budget was discussed. We have been running on fumes since the pandemic, so the discussion centered on making a withdrawal from the investment account to cover the expenses through the end of the year. Pat Roff moved that we move \$15,000 from the investment account to the general fund. Jodi Kunde second the motion. Motion carried.

The Board meeting schedule will include a face-to-face meeting in September with a tour if possible. All members will be invited, and we may add a training class.

Tow summary (Thank you Jason Ennenga!)

Based on the information available, lowa's towing laws allow for a relatively short holding period before a vehicle can be declared abandoned and sold.

Key Points about Iowa Towing Law:

- Quick Towing & Abandonment: A vehicle parked illegally for just 24 hours can be towed and declared abandoned the same day.
- 10-Day Reclaim Period: Owners generally have 10 days from the date of a certified letter notification from the towing company to reclaim their vehicle and/or personal property.
- Shortest Timespan for Sale: Iowa has one of the shortest timeframes nationally for selling a vehicle as abandoned, allowing for sale as early as 10 days after the towing company's written notice.
- Tow Company Keeps Proceeds: If a vehicle towed from private prop-

erty goes unclaimed, the towing company is allowed to keep the proceeds from its sale at public auction.

Comparison to Average Holding Period:

While there is no specific national average for vehicle impound duration provided, the information suggests that lowa's 10-day period for potential sale is considered one of the shortest in the country. This implies that the average holding period in other states is likely longer.

In summary, lowa's towing laws, particularly regarding the holding period before a vehicle can be deemed abandoned and sold, are characterized by quick timelines compared to the national average. This difference has led to criticism from consumer advocates who argue that the laws offer limited protection for vehicle owners.

Welcome from President Mike Swift and call to order at 5:22 p.m. with an Anti-trust statement reminder.

GMARE will be booked at Embassy Suites in LaVista, Nebraska (suburb of Omaha) for March 6-7, 2026.

The board members reviewed the GMARE draft agenda by discussing the proposed topics and drilling down on scheduling and content. Credit card fraud, cyber security and high voltage vehicles topics will be covered on Friday in addition to inventory management classes. Saturday's agenda will be geared toward Sales School topics.

Legislative – DOT contact Mike Swift to discuss changes to junk certificates and NMVTIS, etc. in anticipation of e-titling. Mike will set up an in-person meeting with the DOT and the Legislative committee as soon as possible. We will try to introduce the removal of junk certificates for licensed auto recyclers reporting to NMVTIS which will best accomplished with an lowa NMVTIS system implementation.

Jodi brought up another DOT issues with a letter that was sent out indicating that "temp tags" will no longer be handwritten paper plates but a document issued via the ARTS system on a specific medium supplied by an authorized supplier. Everyone will require an ARTS system login and the supplies to print the document issued with a specific number generated per transfer. Card stock will no longer be available from the county courthouse. Watch for more information form the lowa DOT.

Budget was discussed briefly. The GMARE check was received. The Lobbyist was paid. Scholarships will be paid soon to hit the student's U-bill account at first billing. Hotlines, Inc. will be contacted again to find out if the sponsorship will continue. The Baird account withdrawal will be transacted soon so

that will balance the budget through the end of the year.

Facility tour and/or a face-toface meeting will be planned for September 2025.

Jodi moved to adjourn at 6:27 pm. Pat second. Motion carried

Cyber Security from Ransomware

1. Data Backups & Recovery

Regular, Offline Backups: Routinely back up critical data to an external device or cloud service that is not continuously connected to your network.

Test Restores: Periodically test your backups to ensure they can be restored properly in the event of an attack.

2. Software & System Updates

Patching: Promptly apply software updates and patches as they are released to fix known vulnerabilities that ransomware often exploits.

Automatic Updates:

Configure security software and operating systems to update automatically when possible.

3. Employee Training & Awareness

Phishing Awareness: Train employees to recognize and avoid phishing emails, which often carry ransomware.

Safe Practices: Educate staff on safe internet use, strong passwords, and the risks of downloading files from untrusted sources.

4. Strong Authentication/ Access Controls

Strong Passwords: Enforce policies that require employees to use strong, complex passwords and change them regularly.

Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA): Implement MFA for an extra layer of security, requiring users to verify their identity with multiple methods.

Principle of Least Privilege: Limit user and admin privileges to only the resources necessary for their job to reduce the potential spread of malware.

5. Network & Endpoint Security

Firewalls & Antivirus: Install and maintain firewalls and antivirus software to block unauthorized access and detect malicious programs.



Endpoint Detection & Response (EDR): Use EDR tools to monitor workstations and servers for suspicious activity.

Network Segmentation: Divide your network into smaller, isolated segments to prevent an infection from spreading from one part to another.

6. Incident Response Plan

Develop a Plan: Create a clear, written plan detailing the steps your business will take if a ransomware attack occurs, including who to contact and how to contain the damage.

Containment: Your plan should include how to immediately disconnect infected computers or devices from the network.

Enforcing actions against ransomware

criminals involves a collaborative effort from various government agencies, particularly in the United States involving several key agencies.

Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI): The FBI is the lead federal agency for investigating cyberattacks and intrusions, including ransomware incidents. They focus on identifying and prosecuting cybercriminals and disrupting ransomware networks. They also operate the Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) where the public can report cybercrimes.

Department of Justice (DOJ): The DOJ, through its Criminal Division and specifically the Computer Crime & Intellectual Property Section (CCIPS), leads efforts to fight cybercrime and prosecute those involved in ransomware schemes.

Cyber Security from Ransomware

Department of Homeland Security (DHS): DHS and its components, such as the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), play a significant role in strengthening cybersecurity resilience, investigating malicious cyber activity, and assisting victims of ransomware attacks. CISA also provides resources and tools to help organizations fortify their cybersecurity defenses.

United States Secret Service (USSS): The Secret Service investigates cyber-enabled crimes, with a focus on protecting the nation's financial infrastructure. They also work with partners through their Cyber Fraud Task Forces (CFTF) to combat cybercrime.

Department of the Treasury: The Treasury Department plays a vital role by implementing sanctions against entities and individuals involved in ransomware attacks and other cybercriminal activities. For instance, the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) can designate ransomware groups and prohibit transactions with them, according to Lewis Brisbois Bisgaard & Smith LLP.

International cooperation

Given the transnational nature of ransomware, international cooperation is crucial. The US collaborates with law enforcement agencies and international partners worldwide to investigate and disrupt ransomware operations. Initiatives like the Counter Ransomware Initiative (CRI) foster international collaboration and information sharing to combat this global threat. In essence, a multi-faceted approach involving domestic law enforcement, intelligence agencies, and international collaboration is essential to combat ransomware criminals and protect critical infrastructure and businesses from these cyber threats.



URG has issued an statement recently advising action and announcing upcoming webinars.

URG recommends:

"Steps You Can Take Now

While URG builds long-term protections, we urge you to take the following actions immediately. These same steps will be covered in greater depth during the webinar:

Review Vendor Access: Audit all third-party vendors and the remote access tools they use. Ensure software is fully patched. Revoke access for inactive vendors.

Strengthen Firewalls: Confirm your firewall is configured to block non-essential traffic. Consider a professional review of your setup.

Implement a 3-2-1 Backup Strategy: Maintain at least three copies of your data, on two types of media, with one stored off-site or offline. Regularly test your backups.

Enforce Least Privilege Access: Limit both vendor and employee permissions to only what is necessary. This reduces the damage if one account is compromised.

By taking these proactive steps, we can significantly reduce our collective risk and build a more resilient recycling community.

A Note on Insurance Coverage

If you have been impacted and do not carry a dedicated cyber insurance policy, review your business owners' policy. Some may include coverage for business interruption or limited cyber protections. It's worth confirming with your provider whether cyber-related events are covered."

Cybersecurity for Small Business: Ransomware



RANSOMWARE

Someone in your company gets an email.

It looks legitimate — but with one click on a link, or one download of an attachment, everyone is locked out of your network. That link downloaded software that holds your data hostage. That's a ransomware attack. The attackers ask for money or cryptocurrency, but even if you pay, you don't know if the cybercriminals will keep your data or destroy your files. Meanwhile, the information you need to run your business and sensitive details about your customers, employees, and company are now in criminal hands. Ransomware can take a serious toll on your business.

Cybersecurity for Small Business: Ransomware



HOW TO PROTECT YOUR BUSINESS



Have a plan

How would your business stay up and running after a ransomware attack? Put this plan in writing and share it with everyone who needs to know.



Back up your data

Regularly save important files to a drive or server that's not connected to your network. Make data backup part of your routine business operations.



Keep your security up to date

Always install the latest patches and updates. Look for additional means of protection, like email authentication, and intrusion prevention software, and set them to update automatically on your computer. On mobile devices, you may have to do it manually.



Alert your staff

Teach them how to avoid phishing scams and show them some of the common ways computers and devices become infected. Include tips for spotting and protecting against ransomware in your regular orientation and training.





Limit the damage

Immediately disconnect the infected computers or devices from your network. If your data has been stolen, take steps to protect your company and notify those who might be affected.

Contact the authorities

Report the attack right away to your local FBI office.

Notify customers

If your data or personal information was compromised, make sure you notify the affected parties – they could be at risk of identity theft. Find information on how to do that at Data Breach Response: A Guide for Business. You can find it at FTC.gov/DataBreach.











Keep your business running

Now's the time to implement that plan. Having data backed up will help.

Should I pay the ransom?

Law enforcement doesn't recommend that, but it's up to you to determine whether the risks and costs of paying are worth the possibility of getting your files back. However, paying the ransom may not guarantee you get your data back.

Tariffs on auto parts impact insurance costs and repair claims

New research projects that the national average cost of car insurance could increase 7%. Here's how insurance costs could rise in states by the end of 2025

Cambridge, Mass.—The U.S. has imposed several rounds of tariffs that raise the cost of auto parts. increasing the cost of repair claims for insurers. Recently announced trade deals place tariffs on imports of automobiles and auto parts from Japan, South Korea, and the European Union at 15%.

For context, Japan is the fourth-largest exporter of auto parts to the U.S., South Korea is the fifth, and Germany is the sixth. And inflation, which was falling early in the year, has increased since April, while extreme weather is also fueling high insurance premiums, from fires to flooding.

As a result, insurers are bracing for a rate increase. In an earnings call, Allstate CEO Tom Wilson said, "If we need to raise prices, we will raise prices just like we did in the pandemic because with our margins, we don't have a lot of room to absorb [the cost]."

A new report from Insurify projects that the national average cost of full-coverage car insurance will increase 4% by year's end (\$2,402) and up to 7% (\$2,472) if prolonged tariffs lead to significant insurer losses.

So what does that all mean? Insurify data scientists modeled how insurance costs could rise in each state by the end of 2025, using proprietary quote data, tariff projections and insurance industry losses.

- Year-end annual cost projection, without tariffs: \$1,548 (-2% year-over-year)
- Year-end annual cost projection, with tariffs: \$1,593 (+1% year-over-year)
- Average annual cost (June 2025): \$1,485
- Second half of 2025 projected cost increase: 4% without tariffs
